# Darlington Town Fund: Millions in government cash awarded

In October 2020, Darlington was successfully awarded £23.3m from the Government's Towns Fund.

This Government funding will complement and extend regeneration projects across Darlington. Areas within the Town Centre have already seen improvements and the work will continue in Northgate, and Victoria Road. Extensive work has been done to deliver the relocation of the Cattle Market.

Initial improvements have already been made to Clark's, Buckton's, Mechanics' Yards, and Post House Wynd. Over the next year, further improvements to our Victorian Indoor Market will be delivered, ensuring it is the rightful focal point of the Town Centre.



#### Victoria Road Improvements

Victoria Road has been re-vamped as a key street and will play a vital part in our ambitious plans for Darlington Station. As the main thoroughfare into our town, everything from shop fronts, to lighting, to parking are being considered.

#### Victorian Market Hall

The refurbishment of the market commenced in 2021 and includes street food stalls, new toilets, enhanced entrance areas and a new bar facility.



The Government has allocated a record £139m to transform Darlington Train Station. The project which will transform the areas around the station is already underway. This will also see improvements to the existing station building and platforms.



The new terminal and platforms will be located on the Bank Top side of the station, and will be ready by 2024. Plans are sympathetic to the beautiful Victorian heritage, and will make it a station ready and fit for the future. It will also pave the way for improved rail services for the town and region, helping to connect us with the wider Tees Valley.

Due to open in June 2024, Darlington's new Railway Heritage Quarter has been possible after £39m funding from Tees Valley Combined Authority and Darlington Borough Council. Essential improvements will be undertaken on a number of significantly historic buildings on the site, linking them together to create cluster attractions, including the Skerne Bridge; the oldest working railway bridge in the world. The plans also include a café, a shop, a themed playground, a live engineering building, a temporary exhibition space and extended car parking.

We're proud of our railway heritage and this forms a key part of our vision for Darlington as a tourism attraction. The opportunities this transformation will bring for us and our children are incredible.

#### Central Park

Central Park is home to Darlington College - a Further Education campus. The building work was completed, costing £35m. Alongside the education buildings are homes built by Keepmoat Homes - a development of 367, two, three and four-bedroom houses for first-time buyers, families and professionals. Government investment at the Central Park has included:

- National Biologics Centre £36m.
- Business Central £6.5m.
- Innovation Central £8m.



#### Library Investment

Currently undergoing a £3.2m investment programme which will see the retention and return of some original heritage features, roof repairs and replacement; upgrades to technology, and overhaul of mechanical and electrical systems to improve functionality and energy efficiency



## Riverside and Linear Park

The Linear Park project is ambitious, featuring green space, planting, sustainable drainage and access to the unique riverside setting, including enhanced views of the Skerne Bridge. Ambitions also include finally dealing with Northgate Tower.









#### Affordable Homes

Darlington is a growing town and it is important we have a balance of homes available for people in all circumstances.



It is important, as we develop, we also prioritise local services. This means ensuring our road networks are improved and we see increased access to health services such as GPs and dentists in the development of new housing sites in Darlington.

#### Leisure and Events

We know creating a vibrant and diverse leisure and tourism offer will not only help create jobs and increase visitors, but it will also provide opportunities for families to have fun, create memories and to feel part of the community.

> The Hippodrome has received £1.5m from the Culture Recovery Fund – helping to sustain it for the long term.

The Dolphin Centre has seen £3.5m invested in recent years, seeing the introduction of a bowling alley, new soft play area, refurbished gym, and now a brand new pool.

Eastbourne Sports Complex £1.6m of investment will see a complete new athletics track installed this year, and a new all weather football pitch, complete with spectators stand.

South Park Fireworks returned in 2022 with more than 20,000 local people attending.

#### Safer Streets Fund

Since 2020 the Government has awarded Darlington more than £1.32m as part of the Home Office's Safer Streets Fund, helping to focus on high crime areas and to provide intervention work on specific localised issues, such as antisocial behaviour, door step crime and targeted campaigns like Operation Endurance.

#### More Police for Darlington

Durham Constabulary has received an extra £9.7m in funding since 2020, enabling the force to recruit more police officers and modernise their fleet of police vehicles. This has also seen an increase in capacity to answer more 101 and 999 calls.

#### College Expansion & T-Levels

Queen Elizabeth Sixth Form College is currently expanding, as well as T-Levels being introduced at Darlington College.

More than £336 million was provided to Darlington during the COVID-19 Pandemic, including support for testing facilities, business grants and community support.



£500k awarded to Darlington Council since 2022 to support with homelessness.



£5.6m extra funding allocated to County Durham and Darlington NHS Trust last year to help with winter pressures and A&E demands.



£913k extra provided to Darlington Borough Council to help families during school holiday with food and activities.



£222k for Darlington Borough Council to support and assist anyone fleeing domestic abuse.
